Declining Tax Rate

We are proud to have been successful in addressing our 2018 referendum priorities while lowering the approved tax rate by a total of 32%.

Teacher Compensation

Rising Teacher Salaries Between 2017, the year before the referendum passed, and 2022, starting teacher pay has grown by 25%. Top teacher pay is up 16% in the same timeframe.

As a Special Education Teacher, the referendum has given me the opportunity to build better relationships with my students and families. My caseload of students decreased by five students with the addition of two new teachers funded by the referendum. This allows me more time and

energy to make a bigger impact on education and emotional well-being in school.

The referendum has made a significant difference for middle school students and teachers. Before the referendum, middle school classes had 30-35 students each. With the successful passing of the referendum, we now have about 25 students in every class. This allows students easier access for teacher

help and support. Middle school teachers used to teach about 165 students each day and now they teach about 125 students every day.

As a parent and teacher, I have a unique perspective of life before and after the referendum. Prior to 2018, meeting the needs of all the students was extremely hard because intermediate classroom sizes were at 31, with some up to 33 or 34. Since the referendum, our classroom sizes are at 24.

This is such a big difference. It makes for better classroom management, small group interventions, and one-on-one work with students. The kids also have so many more activities and clubs that they're able to participate in since the referendum. This helps the kids feel connected, which is important with a large school. The referendum has impacted my own children and my students in many positive ways, and many other teachers and parents I know feel the same.
